#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

MAY, 1969

#### DEPARTMENT OF RELIGION AND EDUCATION

Filling a "spot" on the Executive Board headed by President Miriam Salzman has been a most satisfying feeling. I am privileged to have been on this Team.

This year's Department of Religion and Education was fortunate to have the talents and interest of a pair of lovely young mothers in our school - Mrs. Seymour Marias (Seidel) and Mrs. Irving Lebow (Marilyn). As Saturday and Sunday Chairmen of the Religious School, they organized and directed about thirty dedicated room mothers for each day's programs, as they were planned. I'm sure that they have derived deep satisfaction from the successful programs carried out by the Sisterhood in the School - - and I'm also sure that their children were as pleased as they with their participation in the activities.

We started out in September on the 14th and 15th with the opening session of the Religious School, when our committee served coffee and cake in the Broidy Board room and "name tagged" all of our newly joined parents. It was a pleasure to meet parents with interest in their children's Jewish education. At this meeting we also delineated the functions and activities of our particular Department of the Sisterhood.

On October 6th - Sunday morning at 10:00 a.m. - we gathered (about 30 strong) to trim the Succah. This "Task" proved to be a lot of fun! We had the long arms of five men available to us - they took care of the ceiling of the Succah, while we women handled the threading of all the fruits and vegetables, besides filling in of the walls of the Succah. Our own Mrs. Jacob Stacel (Minnie) even came in from the Valley that morning so that she wouldn't miss the "fun!"

That night of October 6th at 5:00 p.m., the Consecration of new students in the Kindergarten thru the 4th Grades was held in the Main Sanctuary. The stage had been laden that morning with the traditional bounty of fruits and vegetables from field and tree in honor of Succot, and looked lovely. The children were given miniature Torahs. Kiddush was held in the newly decorated Succah. It was a beautiful and meaningful service.

Special credit is given, of course, to Mrs. Barney Berman (Sadie) as Chairman of Jewish Ceremonials and Arts. She, with Mrs. Walter Beal (Rose), Mrs. Robert Feder (Rita), and Mrs. Bernard Bergman (Shelly) were the principal directing forces of this activity.

On Sunday night, October 13th, the Sisterhood presented flags and apples to all children attending the Simchat Torah Services. Kiddush after Service was held in the Succah and an Oneg was served in Miller Hall.

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Dept. of Religion and Education

November 22nd, the Sabbath before Thanksgiving, we held a 4th Grade Class Family Dinner in Miller Hall with a Family Service following the dinner in the Sanctuary. It was very well supported. I feel that this function of Sisterhood, begun the term before I took office, is one of the most valuable to have been iniated in recent years.

Hanukkah was celebrated in the Religious School on Saturday and Sunday, December 14th and 15th. Our Room Mothers came forth enthusiastically to serve homemade cookies and punch to all classes and to present a box of Hanukkah candles to the youngest child of every family in our Religious School.

On the weekend of March 1st and 2nd, Purim was celebrated in the Religious School by the reading of the Megillah in the Sanctuary. Before the children filed in to the Service, our Room Mothers handed out gregors to all classes of Kindergarten thru 3rd grades. This year, instead of giving the children Hamentashen in the classrooms, as was our custom, Sisterhood was asked to help our Temple Youth Group achieve success in their Purim Carnival. Therefore, we handed out tickets to all children in School - tickets that were redeemable for two free Hamentashen at the Carnival! We manned a "Sisterhood Booth" for the distribution of these free Hamentashen and sold extras for 5¢. We also manned the booths selling scrip for all events at the Carnival and also sold plastic refrigerator containers. It was a great deal of fun, the TY's made a nice bit of money for their charitable aims and we hope that we can "help" them again in the future.

Preparation for the Model  $S_{\Theta}$ der to celebrate Pesach in the Religious School began about March 24th with the ordering, purchasing and mobilization of women power to implement the preparation and serving of our 600 children on Saturday and Sunday, March 29th and 30th in Miller Hall. With admittedly ambitious goals, we served the children the traditional ceremonial foods of matzo, hard-cooked eggs, parsley, parsnip, charoseth, grape juice and macaroons; however, in addition, we served them a gefilte fishlet and piece of roasted chicken to complete the meal. We were most grateful for the warm response to this lovely meal. We hope to continue this practice.

This Department of Sisterhood also shared in the support of Adult Education classes, Friday Night and Yom Tov Candle Lightings, Religious School transportation, as well as Youth Activities.

In all of these positions, activities, programs, it must be realized that large numbers of willing, helpful hands were necessary and available. I, personally, feel very "full" and warm when I recall the response from Seidel Marias, Marilyn Lebow, all of the members of our Department, room mothers and unnamed mothers and friends who came forth to share in the achievement of this wonderful year. They all know that in life WE GET WHAT WE GIVE!

#### TEMPLE ISRAEL SISTERHOOD GIFT SHOP

It is time again to make our annual report, sorry to say it is not as good as in previous years. It is very discouraging and disheartening as with the same amount of work done, we could have made much more money with a little more support from the membership. This year we took in \$1,300.00 less in gross sales, also we thought that if we took a lower mark up, we would sell more goods, but it didn't work out that way. Last year our gross profit was 31% while this year it was only 22%. Then we had a little more expense this year, a wagon was purchased while I was away, which was very expensive and too large for the shop.

More and more of our customers have joined book clubs, which is very commendable and I don't blame them, but it has resulted in less book sales at the shop. Also our stationery and invitation business has declined, probably we haven't had as many brides in the organization.

We certainly appreciate the business of many loyal customers and thank them for it. Thanks are also due to our wonderful helpers, such as Rose Spencer, Sarah Rice and Flora Jonas, who come regularly without being reminded, sometimes as often as three days each week and can be depended upon at all times.

We have certainly missed Minnie Brown who unfortunately has been ill for a couple of months, and hope that next year she will be able to take part in the shop again.

We are now taking orders for personalized New Year cards and we would urge you to look at them and order too, instead of waiting till the last minute.

We now hand you a check for \$2,500.00, leaving us \$1,700.00 for our working capital in the shop.
