REPORT OF PROGRAM COMMITTEE

It is an accepted fact that programming plays a very important part in any organization. Good programs create larger attendances which in turn means more active members.

We have attempted to have as much variety as possible and yet maintain a high standard.

Our first luncheon meeting was held on Sept. 18th. We called it a "Day in Israel". The food served was as typically Israeli as possible. We had a speaker from the Israeli Consul's Office who described a woman's day in Israel, and the Sam Broude Trio entertained with Israeli songs.

Our October meeting was devoted to the United Nations. In keeping with this, Mrs. Ruth Nussbaum spoke on the topic, "The World Over", in which she gave a very graphic account of her trip to Europe and Israel.

November was membership month so Mrs. Pearl Friedman, Chairman of our Membership Committee presented Rena Waxman in a play reading of "Black Chiffon". At this luncheon all new members were guests of the Sisterhood.

In December, we had our annual raffle luncheon. Mrs. Lottie Halprin, Special Events Chairman, presented a fashion show of Juel Park Lingerie and William Baer Furs. The Bari's provided a delightful musical background.

The meeting in January was cancelled in deference to the All Sisterhood Day held on January 10th.

In February, we observed interfaith month. We had as a speaker Dr. Robert Haas whose topic was the problem of Human Relations in Los Angeles County and the steps being taken to combat intolerance and bigotry.

In March, the period after the meeting was turned over to the playing of bingo.

In April, as has been the custom for some years, the program was devoted to the celebration of Rabbi Nussbaum's birthday. The Women's Choral Group under the able direction of Gertrude Mandelbaum, presented a two-part program. The first part was a Gay Nineties Revue in authentic costume. For the second-half, the group sang a number of Jewish songs honoring Rabbi Nussbaum.

In May, in honor of the birthdays of Rabbi Zerlin and Cantor Saul Silverman, Mrs. Ruth Nussbaum and Mrs. Marjorie Zerlin presented an original skit.

1952 - P.T.A. REPORT

The aims of the PTA to promote and encourage better social relations between the children, and between their parents has, again, been carried out in the energetic program of the Room Mothers of the PTA. Varied interests were attracted to a program that was broad in its scope.

The Adult Class meeting every Sunday had a continuous program of talks and discussions on Religious themes. The Social program for Religious School boys and girls continued with square dancing and ball room dancing. A Party Club was added for the High School Department. Parents met on Wednesday and Saturday evenings for square-dancing and ballroom dancing; and luncheons were given for Room Mothers. Social evenings for the parents with the teachers and the Rabbis help to develop understanding of the aims and ideals of Temple Israel as taught to our children in the Religious School. A Religious School open house in the spring, again, gave parents an opportunity to meet with teachers and to see the rapidly expanding program of visual aids in action in the classrooms. The social year ends with a Religious School picnic in June at North Hollywood park for the families of the Religious School.

The Holidays were celebrated in turn. Room Mothers assisted at the High Holiday Services for children, and honey and bread were served in the classes. The Religious School children helped to collect the fruit for the Sukot; they came into the Temple to tie on the fruits and to present them at the altar. Apples and flags were presented to the boys and girls for Simchat Torah. Individual parties for the very little ones, a big Chanuka program for the intermediate grades, and evening dancing parties for the High School Department made Chanuka a thorough going success. Candles and candies were given to all children. Fruits and nuts were presented to the children and trees were planted on the grounds of the Temple in honor of TuB'shvat. A tremendous Purim Carnival in which Children, PTA Mothers and Sisterhood combined to raise funds for the Temple was a very gala occasion. Model Passover Seders were held for all classes.

The publishing of the Holiday Handbooks to aid parents in celebrating Chanuka, Purim and Passover was the

endeavor of the PTA. Each book gave the story, and ideas for decorations and parties to help the family make each holiday a joyous occasion. The response from non-members and from out of state organizations to these publications has been tremendous.

Each person who has worked and helped with the above program has received the thanks of happy, secure children living in homes which are promoting the ideals of positive Judaism as presented by our spiritual leader and Rabbi, Dr. Max Nussbaum.

REPORT OF RELIGIOUS SCHOOL FESTIVALS

The year of Festivals commenced with the trimming of the Suko on October 14th, 1951, by the children and the Room Mothers. The children and the Sisterhood furnished the greens and the fruit. The Suko was retrimmed for the last day of the holiday. In keeping with the spirit of Suko, boxes of fruit and vegetables were delivered to the Vista Del Mar Orphanage. On the last day of this holiday, children who had enrolled for the first time were given flowers and the Consecration Blessing by our Rabbi. Regular services were conducted.

Chanukah boxes of candles were given to the children in the Religious School, and each box contained pamphlets of prayers and hymns for each night of this holiday. Every family with a child enrolled, received a box, and a bag of Chanukah candy. As has been our custom in the past, Chanukah entertainment was presented by the children of the Religious School. Some of the classrooms were decorated in the Chanukah spirit and had room parties.

Saturday, March 8th, and Sunday, March 9th, marked the Purim celebration, on which dates, costume parades were held depicting biblical characters of the days of Ahasuerus and Esther. Prizes were awarded to the classrooms 3B and 5B, they having had the greatest number of children come in costume. A Carnival and Bazaar was held by the Sisterhood and the PTA; also lunch was served. Games of skill were in order, requiring the payment of one Shekel for participation, and the child winning the most Shekels received a prize. The Carnival and Bazaar paid off financially and helped to finance Religious School activities.

On Saturday, April 5th, and Sunday, April 6th, a Seder was held for the classrooms. They were conducted by the teachers, assisted by the children; also by Rabbi Nussbaum and Rabbi Zerlin, Cantor Silverman and Mr. Lou Mandelbaum, who is Chairman of our Board of Education. Due to the illness of your Chairman, Mrs. Sydney Shostak and her committee prepared the food with the assistance of the PTA. At this time I should like to thank all of them for taking over so capably.

An award will be given to the confirmant having the best attendance record from the date of enrollment in the first grade to the time of Confirmation.

The standards and achievements of our Religious School have been exceptionally high and we are proud of this fact.

This has been a successful year of Festivals and your Chairman is fully cognizant of the fact that without the splendid cooperation and assistance of many, this success would not have been attained. Special thanks is offered at this time to Mrs. Jos. Cooper, President of the Sisterhood, for her guidance during the year; also to Mrs. Leslie Cramer, President of the PTA, and her Room Mothers for their cooperation and help, without which this Chairman could not have functioned. Special thanks is due our Rabbis for their inspirational guidance.

In closing, may I add that I attended the meetings of the Board of Education of the Religious School, as well as those of the PTA. It has been my pleasure to serve our beloved Temple, and I trust God will grant me many more years of continued service.

REPORT ON TEMPLE YOUTH ACTIVITIES

On May 2nd, 3d and 4th, a conclave of Temple Youth Groups was held at Big Bear, Calif., of which Rabbi Zerlin was dean. Ten members of Ty's (Temple Youth), Rabbi and Mrs. Zerlin, and Mr. & Mrs. Geo. Oblath, advisors to the group were present.

The Ty's participated in discussions such as:

- "Wanted, Good Youth Leaders"
- "Who Created the World, God or Darwin"
- "Reform Looks at Conservative and Orthodox Judaism"
- "Rabbi, Should I have a Christmas Tree"
- "Jewish Marriage Customs"

There were seminars on the teen ager and his family. Ethics of the fathers from the Talmud.

A new camp site has been purchased by private individuals of San Francisco congregations at Saratoga, Calif., for West Coast Youth conferences. The estate was purchased from the author, Kathleen Norris, and can house 200 campers and faculty members. Each cabin has a private bath and running water. The grounds are extensive, making it possible for the campers to plan on activities both social and cultural, in which large numbers of people can participate.

The camp will be available to West Coast Temple Youth groups at \$65.00 per person for a 10-day period, plus an approximate \$20.00 transportation charge. All youths attending the conference must travel by the bus provided for that purpose. Adults provide their own transportation.

This year the Conference of Temple Youths will be held from August 7th to 18th, inclusive, at the new camp site.

On May 18, 1952 a meeting of the Ty's was held at Temple Israel for the purpose of electing officers for the year 1952-53. The installation of officers will take place at the home of Philip Cramer on June 15, 1952.

An executive board meeting was held May 26, 1952. The major part of the meeting was devoted to discussing plans for the forthcoming installation affair to be held on June 15th. The balance of the evening was devoted to proposals to be made at the next regular meeting as to minor changes in the constitution. A plea will also be made at this meeting to bring all the confirmants in to the Ty's.

REPORT ON THE CONFERENCE OF JEWISH WOMEN'S
ORGANIZATION

This year, under the very able leadership of Mrs. Charles Goldring, President, the Conference of Jewish Women's Organizations, has done an enviable job in the coordinating of its constituent organizations.

At each meeting held, the morning session was in large part devoted to reports by the heads of various sister groups so that we could become familiar with the activities of each component member. These reports have proven an invaluable exchange of ideas and practices.

In the afternoon sessions, we heard in October from Mr. James Roosevelt, who spoke on the United Nations and the American Foreign Policy. In January, there was a challenging panel discussion on "Education in Age of Crisis." In March, the United Jewish Welfare Fund was discussed. One of the major points of discussion was distributions of money collected for the United Jewish Welfare Fund.

In addition to the meetings, there have already been three Community Tours. The first tour held in November was to Duarte. The second tour of the City Hall held in January, included a number of Departments of our City Government, such as the City Council, Planning Commission, Police Department, Health Department and Department of Civilian Defense. In April, there was a tour of slum areas and of some of the housing projects, under the auspices of the City Housing Authority.

In addition to the above, there have been courses held in leadership training and parliamentary procedures and, through the affiliation of the Conference with the Los Angeles District California Federation of Women's Clubs, the opportunity for any member to participate in any and all of the classes and workshops sponsored by the Federation. The Conference has also held program auditions, presented radio programs, sponsored necessary legislation and actively helped promote all civic, philanthropic and civil defense programs in this area.

I deem it a privilege to have served the Sisterhood of the Temple Israel of Hollywood as delegate to the Conference of Jewish Women's Organizations.

Every Sisterhood member has a responsibility to the Hebrew Union College Scholarship fund. Our quota of \$450.00 is raised through the sale of Uniongrams.

Last summer we mailed a book of four Uniongrams and a letter urging their use to each Sisterhood member, and added \$1.00 to the bill for membership dues. We explained that their dues were not increased, but urged them to use Uniongrams as message-bearers for all occasions, and thereby assist the Scholarship Fund of the Hebrew Union College.

We are happy to report that our members responded graciously and our Sisterhood has mailed a check for \$450.00 to this fund.

We hope our members have acquired the habit of using Uniongrams for birthdays, anniversaries, confirmations, weddings and other occasions, and have none left when we mail another book in August. We must remember that by using Uniongrams we help to further Jewish education - that is our duty.
